WHAT IS ISAAC?

The International Society for Augmentative and Alternative Communication (ISAAC) is a membership organization working to improve the lives of children and adults who use AAC. **ISAAC's vision** is that AAC will be recognized, valued and used throughout the world. **ISAAC's mission** is to promote the best possible communication for people with complex communication needs.

ISAAC's goal is to create worldwide awareness about how AAC can help individuals without speech. ISAAC accomplishes this by sharing information and promoting innovative approaches to research, technology and literacy through AAC. Activities include hosting the ISAAC biennial conference, sponsoring projects, and offering awards and scholarships. ISAAC is a non-governmental organization in Special Consultative Status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC).

- ISAAC was formed in 1983.
- ISAAC has Chapters in 17 countries or regions: Australia, Brazil, Canada, Denmark, French-Speaking Countries/Regions, India, Israel, Italy, Netherlands-Flanders, Norway, Poland, Singapore, Spanish-Speaking Countries/Regions, Sweden, Taiwan, the United Kingdom, and the United States of America.
- ISAAC members include people who use AAC, their families, therapists, teachers, students, doctors, researchers, organizations, and companies that create AAC related products/services.
- The ISAAC International Office is located in Toronto, Canada.

WHAT IS AUGMENTATIVE AND ALTERNATIVE COMMUNICATION (AAC)?

AAC is a set of tools and strategies that an individual uses to solve every day communicative challenges. Communication can take many forms such as: speech, a shared glance, text, gestures, facial expressions, touch, sign language, symbols, pictures, speech generating devices, etc. Everyone uses multiple forms of communication, based upon the context and our communication partner. Effective communication occurs when the intent and meaning of one individual is understood by another person. The form is less important than the successful understanding of the message.

- Advocates for augmented communicators and their families
- Supports the use of AAC around the world
- Facilitates international information exchange through its website and publications
- Encourages AAC research activities
- Promotes AAC products and services
- Celebrates and supports *International AAC Awareness Month* every October
- Holds an international conference every two years. The 19th Biennial Conference of ISAAC, Conference Cancún, was held on July 24-27, 2023.
- Sponsors *Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC)*, a peer-reviewed scientific journal
- Supports and provides awards and scholarship programs for members
- Sponsors major projects, including *BUILD and LEAD*
